

The most commonly used characters for transliterating Arabic, along with the keystrokes necessary for typing them using the Alt-Latin keyboard for Windows. (For Macintosh, use either Option key instead of Alt.)

Alt+p = <sup>ˆ</sup> (‘ayn)

Alt+shift+p = <sup>ˆ</sup> (hamza)

Alt+e, then a = á

Alt+a, then a, i, or u = ā, ī, or ū

Alt+a, then A, I, or U = Ā, Ī, or Ū

Alt+period, then d, h, s, t, or z = ḏ, ḥ, ṣ, ṭ, or ḏ

Alt+period, then D, H, S, T, or Z = Ḑ, Ḥ, Ṣ, Ṭ, or Ḑ

To type Ḑ or Ḑ, first type Z or z, then press alt + shift + ; simultaneously.

For Ḑ or Ḑ, press alt + x, then Z or z.
